Buckingham Palace - since 1952 this palace has been The Queen's working home but it hasn't always served in that role. Indeed, for more than 300 years, from 1531 until 1837, the King of England's official residence in the capital city was St. James' Palace. Buckingham Palace is located in the City of Westminster, the palace is often at the centre of state occasions and royal hospitality. It has been a focal point for the British people at times of national rejoicing and mourning.

Kensington Palace - Queen Victoria spent her childhood here. She left to live in Buckingham Palace in 1837. More recently, the palace has been home to Diana, Princess of Wales, Princess Margaret and The Duke and Duchess of Sussex. It is also the London home of The Duke and Duchess of Cambridge and their children.

Hampton Court Palace – Built by Sir Christopher Wren as an elegant new baroque palace. Georgian kings and princes occupied the splendid interiors. When the royals left in 1737, impoverished 'grace and favour' aristocrats moved in. Queen Victoria opened the palace to the public in 1838. It has remained a magnet for millions of visitors, drawn to the grandeur, the maze, the ghosts and the fabulous art collection.

Sandringham House – is in Norfolk, England. It is one of the royal residences of Elizabeth II, whose father, George VI, and grandfather, George V, both died there. The house stands in a 20,000-acre (8,100 ha) estate in the Norfolk Coast Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

The Palace of Holyrood - plays an important role as the official residence of Queen Elizabeth II when she visits Edinburgh. As well as its significance in state life, the house offers a vivid insight into the history of Scotland and its sometimes turbulent past.

Balmoral Castle - has been the Scottish home of the Royal Family since it was purchased for Queen Victoria by Prince Albert in 1852, having been first leased in 1848.

Windsor Castle - is revered as the oldest and largest occupied castle in the world. It was founded by William the Conqueror in the 11th century and has since been the home of 39 monarchs. Today The Queen spends most of her private weekends at the Castle.

Our own Elizabeth Castle - has defended Jersey for more than 400 years; the battlements date back to the 1590's, when Sir Walter Raleigh was Governor of Jersey from 1600 until 1603. The grounds gave refuge to King Charles II during the English Civil War and visitors can see the bunkers which were re-fortified to command the sea approaches to Jersey during the German Occupation in World War II and access to the hermitage where St Helier is thought to have lived around 550 A.D.



DID YOU KNOW?

Here in Jersey, the British monarch is known as the "Duke of Normandy" notwithstanding the fact that the current monarch, Queen Elizabeth II, is a woman. Many of you will know that the Channel Islands are the last remaining part of the former Duchy of Normandy to remain under the rule of the British monarch. Although the English monarchy relinquished claims to continental Normandy and other French claims in 1259, the Channel Islands remain Crown dependencies of the British throne.

So during our loyal toasts to Her Majesty, you may hear, "The Duke of Normandy, our Queen", or "The Queen, our Duke" or, in French "La Reine, Notre Duc", rather than simply "The Queen", as is customary in the United Kingdom.
